City Manager James Timonere stated that Finance Director Vladimir Kan had forwarded him a budget draft, and they would be meeting the next morning to begin reviewing it. He expected to present the budget to Council by mid-October. He also noted that negotiations with unions would begin on Friday, with the intention of completing the process quickly.

City Solicitor

City Solicitor Cecilia Cooper reported on the City's efforts to clean up properties through injunctions. So far, her office has filed injunctions against 25 different properties. There have been four either consent judgments or default judgments entered, with others in various stages of court proceedings. She explained that the City is seeking injunctive relief requiring property owners to clean up their properties or bring them into compliance. If they fail to comply, they can be brought before the court for contempt hearings, where the judge can fine them \$100 each time they're in contempt. This process is faster and carries a bigger penalty than the criminal process.

In response to President John Roskovics's request for clarification, City Solicitor Cecilia Cooper explained that in this process, someone calls the Department of Planning and Community Development, who sends out a building inspector. If violations are observed, the owner is notified, given a letter, and time to fix the issues. If they don't comply, the case is brought to the Solicitor's office for injunctive relief. The property owner is then served by certified mail with the motion.

In response to questions from Ward 5 Councilor Jane DiGiacomo, City Manager James Timonere confirmed that the city has both a housing inspector and a code enforcement officer.

After the vote, Ward 4 Councilor Jodi Mills thanked the owners of Becker's Restaurant for their investment in the City, noting that they were expanding their employees and offering affordable, quality products.

Unfinished Business

Ward 2 Councilor Terence Guerriero asked several questions regarding the Master Plan. He requested a list of committee members, which City Manager James Timonere stated that he would provide. He also confirmed that the plan is being developed in conjunction with Envision consulting firm and asked what the cost would be. City Manager James Timonere stated that Council approved a contract with Envision earlier this year for approximately \$70,000 to \$80,000. Ward 2 Councilor Terence Guerriero asked how long the process would take. City Manager James Timonere stated that the master plan portion would be completed by June with the zoning work to follow. Ward 2 Councilor Terence Guerriero asked if Council would vote on the final product. City Manager James Timonere stated that the final plan would go to the Planning Commission first for review and then the Planning Commission would make a recommendation to Council. Ward 2 Councilor Terence Guerriero asked if Council could be kept informed as the project moves forward. City Manager James Timonere explained that the process would include community engagement meetings, a community survey, and a dedicated website linked to the City's website to keep everyone informed. He agreed to provide reports to Council following committee meetings.

Ward 3 Councilor RoLesia Holman also raised concerns about whether diversity is being considered on the Master Plan, including ward representation, gender equity, racial equity, and business representation. She stated that it is her hope that these things are being considered on the front end to minimize potential issues after the Master Plan is completed.

Ward 5 Councilor Jane DiGiacomo mentioned two issues. She stated that recently a constituent expressed interest in serving on a City board and, after reviewing the City's boards and commissions roster, she discovered there are many with expired terms. She stated that people have expressed an interest in getting involved and this is something that needs to be updated. The second issue she noted is that speeding continues to be an issue in neighborhoods.

New Business

Ward 5 Councilor Jane DiGiacomo stated that residents on Washington Avenue, between Bunker Hill and West 58th Street, are requesting that "No Parking" signs be placed on the same side of the street as the fire hydrant, rather than the opposite side as is currently the case. She also stated that residents on West 58th Street, from West Avenue to Nathan Avenue, are requesting that "Slow Down — Children at Play" signage be installed due to ongoing speeding problems and recent accident. City Manager James Timonere stated that both requests would need to go to the Safety Forces Committee. The Police Department would conduct a study to determine if moving the "No Parking" sign is needed.

Tell Us Something We Don't Know

City Manager James Timonere announced that October 9th (Thursday) is the 100th birthday of the Lift Bridge, and the Lift Bridge Community Association will hold a celebration at 5:30 PM at the transient dock, followed by a picture at the bridge. The community is invited to attend.

Ward 5 Councilor Jane DiGiacomo thanked Council members for wearing pink in recognition of Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Ward 5 Councilor Jane DiGiacomo shared information about the Paul and Norma Tikkanen Juried Art Exhibit at the Ashtabula Art Center, open throughout October. The exhibit hours are Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The exhibition is in its fourth year and had 450 applicants. The first-place winners (\$15,000 prizes) were Ryan Humphrey for abstract art and Lilly Buttitta for realism. Second-place winners (\$6,000 prizes) were Phillip Buntin for abstract art and Katie Richards for realism. There were also honorable mentions with \$1,200 prizes. She highly recommended visiting the exhibit.

Ward 4 Councilor Jodi Mills highlighted recent positive developments in the City including the Kids for Positive Change beach cleanup at Walnut Beach on September 20; the recent conference hosted by the Water Pollution Control Plant; Bula Brewfest in the Harbor; Harvest in the Harbor; new businesses opening downtown; the Bagel Barn ribbon cutting; West 38th Street Park improvements; DeGeorge & Polverini Law Firm ribbon cutting; the upcoming ribbon cutting at the Ashtabula Dream Center; and, the Lift Bridge celebration. She also mentioned the HALO (Holiday Angels Loving Others) Gala for Catholic Charities on November 8, 2025 at Our Lady of Peach Community Center. Tickets are \$75 per person, which includes food and open bar.

Ward 2 Councilor Terence Guerriero congratulated Alex and Sarah Izzi for the Izzi Cancer Research Bocce

Tournament held on October 4. The event featured 20 teams, a rock and roll band, and raised money for cancer research. He also thanked the Public Works staff for their efforts at the Massucci Field Sports Complex, where softball and youth football events were happening.

Public Communications on General Matters

Blake Hinkle, of Union Avenue and W. 16th Street, discussed the ordinance regarding tree replacement in City parks that is being proposed by the Parks & Recreation Board. He apologized for any procedural missteps regarding the tree legislation, explaining he's new to the board and trying to make a positive impact on the City. He requested continued work on the legislation, which he believes is important. City Manager James Timonere noted that with the Solicitor's input and Mr. Hinkle's input, the tree ordinance is a good piece of legislation. He suggested incorporating it into the City's existing tree chapter in the codified ordinances and adding a reference to the parks' legislation.

Heroldine Scruggs, of Cleveland Avenue, expressed concerns about disrespectful behavior by Council members during the public comment portion of a previous meeting, specifically mentioning eye-rolling by a panel member. She stated that respect should be mutual between citizens and Council members.

Austin Clark, of Columbus Avenue, thanked the City for quickly fixing a burned-out traffic light on the north side of Columbus after he reported.

Cindy Payjac, who recently moved back to Ashtabula from Florida, expressed sadness at the condition of downtown Ashtabula, mentioning a burned house on West Avenue, properties on Route 20, an old building on Center Street before the bridge, and a boarded-up brick building near Huntington Bank. She questioned whether two code enforcement officers were enough and suggested more needs to be done to make property owners maintain their properties. President John Roskovics explained that the legal process for addressing property issues is slow, with 28-day response periods and various delays.

Mary Graves, of Washington Avenue, discussed damage to sidewalks from the gas line repairs recently done by Enbridge.

Susan Smith, of Jefferson Avenue, thanked the City Manager for removing the asphalt at Domino's. She also thanked the City Manager for working to get the U.S. Coast Guard Station in the Harbor manned. She commended the efforts of the Ashtabula Fire Department and Ashtabula Police Department during the recent rescue on Lake Erie. Mrs. Smith asked for information on the City's ordinance on litter in public places. She noted the speeding issues on her street. She suggested having the police patrol the area. She asked about the paint on the sewer grates on the street. City Manager James Timonere stated he would look into it. It could possibly be related to the Enbridge project.

Ryan Lencl, of Main Avenue, asked about enforcement actions against the Dollar General Market, which he described as an eyesore with missing siding, unmaintained grounds, and a garbage-filled retention pond. City Manager James Timonere confirmed that violation letters had been issued months ago, and the matter was now being referred to the Solicitor's Office. Mr. Lencl asked for clarification on the three Charter amendment issues that will be on the ballot in November. Mr. Lencl thanked the City Manager for his prompt response to an email he sent regarding graffiti.

Mrs. Smith suggested that citizens might be willing to donate "memory trees" to help with the cost of tree planting in parks. She also asked about the status of the downtown façade and sidewalk improvements. City Manager James Timonere noted that the proposed tree ordinance includes a provision for such donations. He also explained that the City received a \$1.6 million grant for Main Avenue sidewalks and business façades that must be spent by October next year. The state recently changed requirements so that the city must hold all contracts rather than individual businesses. Sidewalk work will begin in the spring, and the project will include decorative street lighting. He added that the City also received a \$1.2 million grant to redo Collins Boulevard next year.
